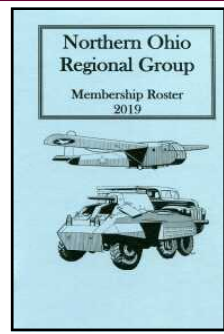

V-8 Times Dan Wittern Settlement Statement

The Club's pursuit of its proven claim against Dan Wittern for misuse of \$217 thousand of Club funds during 2008 through mid-2013 has been settled for \$472 thousand. Along with \$50 thousand of insurance coverage, the result has been the full recovery of the lost funds and all of the costs expended to achieve that result.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of the Club's Audit Committee and Wayne Deitrich for bringing this sad chapter in the Club's history to a successful conclusion.

Concurrently, the management of the Club's financial resources has been completely restructured with appropriate separation of duties, formal approval authorities and purchasing procedures, and annual third-party independent audits.

Editor 's Note: Dan Wittern had been the National Club's Business Manager for years. An audit suggested that funds had been misappropriated. As a result, litigation was brought against him

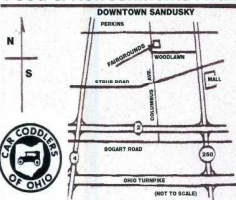

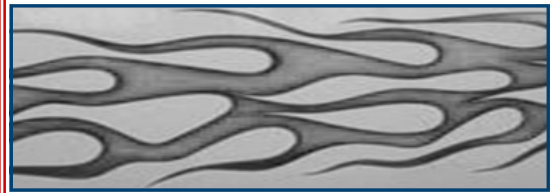

The 80th Anniversary of Mercury

2019 marks the 80th Anniversary of the introduction of the Mercury automobile. It traces the roots from 1939 until 1953, the period that is recognized by the Early Ford V-8 Club of America. We plan on presenting four generations of Mercury to our readers during the coming months.

These are:

- First generation; 1939 ~ 1940;
- Second generation 1941 ~ 1948;
- Third generation; 1949 ~ 1951
- Forth generation; 1952 ~ 1953.

This month we will discuss the First Generation. 1939 ~ 1940

Background: The *Mercury Eight* is an automobile that was marketed by the Mercury division of Ford between 1939 and 1951. The debut model line of the Mercury division, Ford slotted the full-size Mercury Eight between the Ford Deluxe (later Custom) model lines and the Lincoln. In total, Ford assembled three generations of the Eight (before and after World War II). During its production, the Eight offered a full range of body styles, including coupes, sedans, convertibles, and station wagons. For its first generation, the Eight was produced with its own body, adapting its own version of a Ford body for its second generation; for the third generation, the Eight shared its body with the Lincoln.

For the 1952 model year, Ford expanded its namesake division to three nameplates and Lincoln and Mercury to two each, with Mercury replacing the Eight with Monterey (introduced in 1950 as a trim option), lasting until 1974.



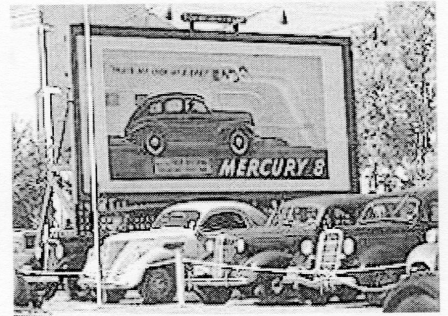
First Generation (1939 –1940)

The advertisements for this car declared it to be "The car that truly dares to ask 'Why?'" , referring to the idea that a big car couldn't also be economical. The Mercury was

priced in the thousand dollar range, several hundred dollars more than the Ford V-8, several hundred less than the Lincoln-Zephyr and

about the same as the upper-range Oldsmobile and Dodges, Hudsons, and the lower-range Buicks and DeSotos, sales from all

of which, it was hoped, the new Mercury would usurp. Its engine was a 95 hp version of the Ford flathead V8 engine, its styling was inspired by the Zephyr, and it had hydraulic brakes from the beginning. 1940. Braking was via 12-inch drums.

With a wheelbase of 116.0 in and an overall length of 196.0 in, it was a good-sized car, which the Ford company advertised extensively, together with its up-to-20 mpg performance-"few cars of any size can equal such economy." Double sun visors became standard. Although the "Eight" script would not appear on the front of the hood until the 1941 model year, sales literature prominently referred to the car as the "Mercury Eight" from the very beginning. This is no doubt because the actual series names, 99A in 1939 and 09A in 1940, were somewhat less enticing. A 1940 09A model has the words "Mercury

Eight" in an emblem that runs from front to rear alongside the top hood lines on both sides. It appears as chrome wording on top of a double red bar. By the end of 1940 Mercury could run with the headline "It's made 150,000 owners change cars!"

Bonnie and Clyde were Ford tough

To robbers, powerful car's engine was a steal

On April 13, 1934, Ford Motor Co. received a notorious endorsement.

"Dear Sir," read the handwritten letter addressed to Henry Ford. "While I still have got breath in my lungs I will tell you what a dandy car you make. I have drove Fords exclusively when I could get away with one."

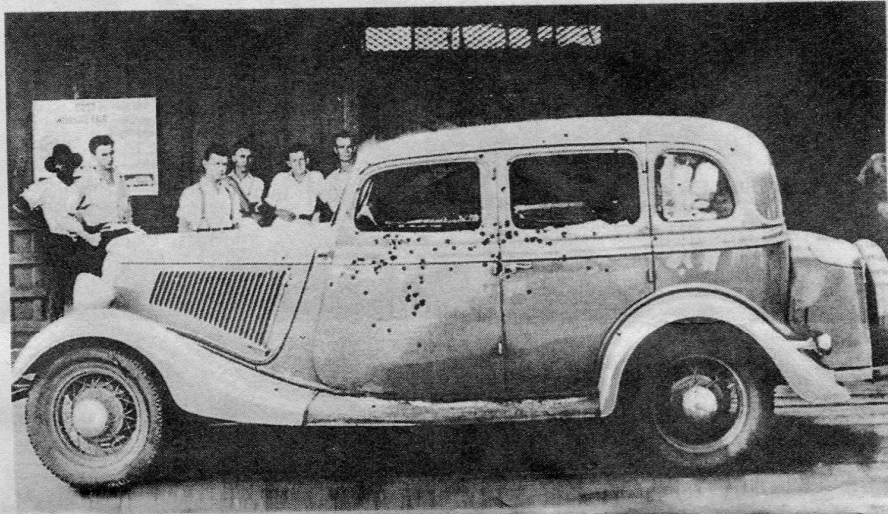
"Get away" being operative words — the letter was signed, "Yours truly Clyde Champion Barrow."

Barrow, whose given middle name was Chestnut, is among the most famous criminals in American history. With accomplice Bonnie Parker and other running mates, Bonnie and Clyde committed robberies, kidnappings, car thefts and killings from their native Texas as far north as Minnesota from 1932-34.

Barrow's preference for Fords with what then was a powerful engine raises the question: What would be today's great getaway cars?

We'll get to that in a moment.

The letter, which is in possession of The Henry Ford museum in Dearborn, Michigan, went on to say: "For sustained speed and freedom from trou-

ble the Ford has got ever other car skinned and even if my business hasn't been strickly legal it don't hurt anything to tell you what a fine car you got in the V8 —"

(He was a criminal, not a spelling bee champion.)

Ted Ryan, archives and heritage brand manager for Ford, notes that "no one has ever truly verified the handwriting to prove conclusively that it is Clyde Barrow's. That is part of the fun of history. Personally, I think it is true."

Bonnie and Clyde, being intensely hunted at the time of the letter, just a few weeks before being ambushed by lawmen and riddled with bullets in Louisiana, certainly were not publicity-averse. They posed for photos and were brazenly aware of their celebrity.

Ryan said Ford had introduced the single block cast V8 engine just a few years before.

"The resulting engine was a modern

marvel and provided the power the public was looking for at a price they could afford," he said in an email. "Suddenly, higher-powered engines were available to everyone, including Clyde Barrow."

In addition to the tons of fun I am having with all this, there are two bits of good news resulting from these dancing and cheerleading activities that I would like to share with everyone:

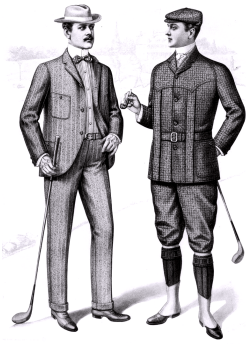
