



#### **World War II Ends**


By January 1945 the world was beginning to see the end of a war that had caused more destruction and death than had ever been witnessed. It was also the beginning of the end of a bitter war within the management of the Ford Motor Company.

Charles Sorensen "Cast Iron Charlie", the creator of the Willow Run and Rouge Plants, the designer of many of Henry Ford's ideas, and the very mortar that held the Ford Motor Company together for forty years had resigned in January 1944. Edsel Ford had passed away at 1:10 A.M. on May 26,1943 just five months short of his fiftieth birthday. Some say the cause of death was a broken heart over the cynical treatment by his father as they worked together to manage one of the largest companies in the history of America up to that time.



Henry Ford JJ had enlisted in the Navy after Pearl Harbor, but after Edsel's death, in order to save the Ford Motor Company, Secretary of the Navy, Knox granted him a special discharge in late July 1943. He arrived at the Rouge on August 10,1943. At the age of 25 he was called to lead the company to a new level of excellence.

Two looming obstacles stood in his way to resurrect the company. First, was his grandfather. Henry Ford's health was failing and he was becoming increasingly difficult to deal with. In addition, Henry did not trust or like his grandson. The tension between the two was fueled by Henry II belief that his grandfather killed his father by the way he treated him. The second was Harry



Bennett, Chief of the Service Department. Bennett had become Henry Ford's henchman and while Ford's health declined he made plans to take over the company.

It was actually the women in the family who took control. Upon learning of the Bennett's intent, Henry Ford's wife, Clara, along with her daughter-in-law, Eleanor (Edsel's widow), decided that Henry II represented the future of the company. Old Henry Ford's health was clearly failing and Bennett was laying the ground work to become President. Clara and Eleanor Ford were determined and they were prepared to take drastic measures if Henry II did not become president. Clara Ford eventually accomplished the impossible. Working on her husband through the summer of 1945, she slowly in-

duced the old autocrat finally to relinquish his power and hand it not to Harry Bennett, his alter ego, but to the family's choice.

On September 20, 1945, Henry Ford II was summoned to the gloomy halls of Fair Lane. There his grandfather beckoned him into a chair and informed him that he was, finally ready to step aside and let the young man take over the presidency of the company.

Henry II called a board meeting the next day and as B.J. Craig, the Treasurer, started to read old Henry's resignation letter into the minutes Harry Bennett got up bitterly to leave the room. He knew what was coming. Prevailed to stay, he got through the resignation and the vote that confirmed it. Henry II's next act was to fire Bennett, which was done the very next day.

While Henry II proved to be a good company leader, he knew he needed help. The company which he took over in September 1945 was near death. The caliber of the surviving management, engineering and financial staff was patchy.

In October 1945, Henry Ford II hired the "Whiz Kids". This was a group of ten young Air Force officers who had developed particular planning and financial skills during the war, and who decided to stick together and hire themselves out, in peacetime, as a ready made management team. The young officers' expertise was considerable, for they had served together in the office of statistical control, the administrative pivot that had helped make the U.S. Army Air Force the massive and dominating power it had become by the end of World War II. The group consisted of the head of the Office of Statistical Control, Charles Bates "Tex" Thornton, age thirty-two, one of the youngest colonels in the U.S. Army Air Force; Arjay Miller, before becoming an Air Force Officer, he had lectured on business at the University of California, Los Angeles; Robert S. McNamara had been on the faculty of the Harvard Business School; J. "Ed" Lundy had served in the economics department of Princeton; Francis C. Reith, like Thornton, had established a record of business success before joining up.

The group also included Wilbur R. Anderson, Charles E. Bosworth, Ben Davis Mills, George Moore and James O. Wright. At that time they aged between twenty-six and thirtyfour. By the time all ten had completed their business careers, six had become Ford Vice -Presidents, two had served as President of the company, three had taken chief-executive jobs in other companies, one had held a cabinet office and one had dreamed up a car called the Edsel.

In addition, through his "Industrial Relations Department", Henry U launched a training program to bring college graduates to Ford. It had been agreed to bring in only

fifty recruits in this first class of 1945, but a young engineer from Allentown, Pennsylvania, named Lee Iacocca insisted on being included and became the fifty-first.

Together they went forward to restructuring the company and to produce a post war auto. And finally, on October 26,1945, a day designated as "V-8 Day", Henry U brought out the first postwar car. It was a 1942 model spruced up with a little extra trim and a few engine modifications, but it symbolized the return to business as usual that the company, its customers and indeed all of America had been waiting for.
