



### **MINUTES FOR THE JULY 2022 MEETING**

While there is a Grand National Meet planned for next year, there are no regional meets scheduled because of a lack of volunteers willing to organize them. A strategy for encouraging volunteers needs to be developed.

Steve also gave an extensive description of the recent regional meet in Tennessee. It was an extremely enjoyable and well planned meet in spite of the fact that it was put together by a very small group of people. Visits to two unique car museums and a trip to the Grand Ole Opry were two of the highlights. One of the highlights (for our club) was that member Ed Carr won the Coker tire raffle. 

## U.S. corn-based ethanol worse for the climate than gasoline, study finds By Leah Douglas

Feb 14 (Reuters) - Corn-based ethanol, which for years has been mixed in huge quantities into gasoline sold at U.S. pumps, is likely a much bigger contributor to global warming than straight gasoline, according to a study published Monday.

The study, published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, contradicts previous research commissioned by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) showing ethanol and other biofuels to be relatively green.

President Joe Biden's administration is reviewing policies on biofuels as part of a broader effort to decarbonize the U.S. economy by 2050 to fight climate change.

"Corn ethanol is not a climate-friendly fuel," said Dr. Tyler Lark, assistant scientist at University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for Sustainability and the Global Environment and lead author of the study.

The research, which was funded in part by the National Wildlife Federation and U.S. Department of Energy, found that ethanol is likely at least 24% more carbon-intensive than gasoline due to emissions resulting from land use changes to grow corn, along with processing and combustion.

Geoff Cooper, president and CEO of the Renewable Fuels Association, the ethanol trade lobby, called the study "completely fictional and erroneous," arguing the authors used "worst-case assumptions [and] cherry-picked data."

Under the U.S. Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS), a law enacted in 2005, the nation's oil refiners are required to mix some 15 billion gallons of corn-based ethanol into the nation's gasoline annually. The policy was intended to reduce emissions, support farmers, and cut U.S. dependence on energy imports.

As a result of the mandate, corn cultivation grew 8.7% and expanded into 6.9 million additional acres of land between 2008 and 2016, the study found. That led to widespread changes in land use, including the tilling of cropland that would otherwise have been retired or enrolled in conservation programs and the planting of existing cropland with more corn, the study found.

Tilling fields releases carbon stored in soil, while other farming activities, like applying nitrogen fertilizers, also produce emissions.

A 2019 study from the USDA, which has been broadly cited by the biofuel industry, found that ethanol's carbon intensity was 39% lower than gasoline, in part because of carbon sequestration associated with planting new cropland.

But that research underestimated the emissions impact of land conversion, Lark said.

USDA did not respond to a request for comment.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, which administers the nation's biofuel policy, is considering changes to the program. Under the RFS, Congress set blending requirements through 2022, but not beyond, giving the EPA authority to impose reforms. EPA plans to propose 2023 requirements in May.


### Dave & Nancy Collette's Picnic Saturday July 30th
























No matter how careful you are about stopping on time, you're leaving yourself wide open for an accident if your brakes aren't safe. Here's how to test them.

If you can hear your brakes squeaking when you stop, it's a sign that your brake linings may be worn out. If pressing down hard on your brakes puts the pedal within an inch of the floor, your brakes need either adjusting or more brake fluid.

It's best to let your Ford Dealer

examine your brakes scientifically. He'll tell you if your linings are so badly worn that they need replacing. When they do, don't put it off. Worn linings may make your brake drums warp and lead to a costly repair job.

Sometimes your brakes may fail because they're wet. If you've driven through a puddle, try your brakes. If you find they're wet, push the pedal down several times. The heat caused by friction will dry them for you.

### Plum Perfect Polish Fall Delicacies

### Polish Plum Cake

Placek ze śliwkami



### Ingredients:

- 2 cups of plums (sour cherries or berries)
- 9 oz. (250g) of butter
- 5 eggs
- 1 cup (250g) of granulated sugar
- · 2 cups (250g) of flour
- · 1 tsp. of baking powder
- · Pinch of salt
- · Powdered sugar (optional)

### Directions:

Bring eggs and butter to room temperature. Wash plums and remove pits (if using large plums cut them into smaller pieces). Beat butter with sugar until fluffy. Separate the whites from yolks. Add yolks to the butter/sugar mixture one by one and beat until combined. Mix flour with baking powder and salt and gradually add to the mixture. Beat egg whites to a firm foam, and gently fold into batter until combined.

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C). Line a 9x13in (22x33 cm) baking dish with parchment paper. Transfer mixture into a baking dish and spread fruit evenly on top (skin side down). Bake for 45-55 min. or until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out dry (there may be a bit of moisture from the fruit).

Sprinkle with powdered sugar before serving and enjoy with a cup of good tea or coffee!



### Plum Butter Powidła śliwkowe

This recipe requires only two ingredients - plums and sugar, and can easily be increased. Polish powidla is used as a spread on bread, rolls, pancakes, but also in sauces, pastries and sometimes in the national dish of Poland – bigos (Hunter's Stew).



### Ingredients:

- 1 lb. plums (Italian or damson, washed, halved, and pitted)
- 1/2 to 1 cup sugar

#### Directions:

Place plums in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer until plums completely break down and are tender, stirring with a wooden spoon. Add sugar to taste, and continue to cook and stir until butter is thick enough so when a spoonful is turned upside down, it doesn't immediately drop back into the pan. If your fruit was sweet and ripe, you don't need much sugar. Place hot powidla into hot sterilized jars, leaving 1/4" headspace. Cover with hot sterilized lids and rings. Process in a water bath for 10 minutes. Remove to counter and allow to cool before storing in a cool, dry, dark place. If you don't process it, the butter can be kept refrigerated for up to three weeks or frozen for up to one year.

### Plum Dumplings Knedle ze śliwkami

Simple and old (1871) recipe by famous Polish cookbook author Lucyna Ćwierczakiewiczowa.



### Ingredients:

- · 1 egg
- 1Tbsp.of milk
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 1.2 lb. of potatoes
- 12 plums
- Honey or sugar (optional)

### Directions:

Cook, and drain potatoes, while still warm add milk, egg, mash well, and then add sifted flour. Knead dough until smooth, it should be moist and sticky. Wash plums, cut removing pits. Flatten a piece of dough on the palm of your hand, take the plum (with a little honey or sugar inside) and wrap it with dough shaping a ball. Gently transfer dumpling into boiling water, and cook for about 10 minutes. Gently remove from the pot, serve hot with buttered breadcrumbs\*.

### \*Buttered breadcrumbs.

Melt butter in a small skillet over medium-low heat. As soon as the butter is melted and frothy, stir in breadcrumbs. Continue stirring until crumbs are evenly crisp and golden brown.
