



MINUTES FOR THE MEETING OF AUGUST 19, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by president Jack Bukszar. Members and guests were asked to introduce themselves and say a few words about their cars.

Our speaker for the evening was Craig Holy. Craig operates a one-man restoration business in Chardon, Ohio, and has restored cars for several of our members. His interest in cars began with assembling and painting model cars when he was a boy. His interest in mechanical things grew when he rebuilt a Briggs and Stratton engine in his youth. Cars remained a hobby for him while he pursued a career in carpentry, but he slowly shifted to car restoration as a main interest. Craig offered a number of tips to anyone considering doing a restoration. These included:

- 1. If you are considering buying a "project" car to restore, don't pay more than 20% of what the car will sell for when it has been completely restored.
 - 2. Use a magnet to check the project car for excessive bondo before you buy it.
 - 3. Take lots of pictures of each component of the project car as you disassemble it.
 - 4. Put each part of the car that you take apart into a ziplock bag or other suitable container and clearly label it.
- 5. Make a complete list of the parts you need to reassemble the car and order them as early as possible. This is especially important in these times of supply chain delays and other such issues.
- 6. Send out any sections of the job that you need to farm out to machine shops, engine builders, or other specialty shops as early as possible so you can get them back when you are ready to install them.
- 7. If possible, get copies of any assembly manuals and parts books that are available for the car you are working on. They can save you much time and frustration when it comes time to put the car back together.
- 8. Be sure you have copies of the latest catalogs from major suppliers of V8 parts, such as Carpenter, C & G, and Drake before you start on the project.
- 9. Research the quality, prices, availability, and turn around time for services you will need, such as chrome plating, upholstery, wiring, glass, painting, instrument rebuilding, and stainless dent removal and polishing.
- 10. Restore small parts first and put them away (hopefully where you can find them again) so they will be ready for reassembly when the larger parts of the job have been finished.
- 11. Use quality products even if they cost more. Cheaper paints, for example, might not really save you money because you have to use more of the product to accomplish the job and they do not hold up as well as the better quality paints.
- 12. Be careful about using vapor blasting as a way to prepare metal for painting. It may lead to problems with paint adhesion.
- 13. Wait at least six months before waxing a new paint job. Waxing too early can prevent the paint from curing properly.
- 14. Find a four leaf clover and keep it in your garage for good luck. (Craig didn't really say that, but I thought it would be a good idea. NG)

President Jack called for the secretary to present a summary of the minutes of the July meeting. The summary was approved as presented.

Treasurers Dan and Diane Frances reported that our treasury is in good shape. Membership chair Craig Gorris reported that we have about 94 paid members. This makes our club one of the largest regional groups in the national club. Craig also reported that things are going well with the Headliner although co-editor Annette has suffered a broken ankle. The club wishes her a speedy recovery.

National representative Steve Kronen reported that there will be a Grand National Meet in Dearborn, Michigan, on June 10-17, 2023. He was happy to also report that four regional groups have expressed interest in hosting regional meets in 2023. He informed us that the national club will soon produce a book that will be of great help to anyone restoring a 1935-1936 Ford truck. He encouraged members to run for national offices. Steve is considering becoming a candidate for the office of vice president of the national club.

President Jack informed us that 22 members of NORG and the Nifty Fifties Club attended the trip to the Gilmore Museum in Michigan. Everyone who toured the museum agreed that it is well worth the trip.

David and Nancy Collette again hosted an excellent picnic at their farm in Pennsylvania on July 30. The turnout was excellent and the amount of food was, as usual, far more than we could eat. Thanks David and Nancy!!!!



A Long Search for THE CAR By Paul Kron

I first saw the car in 1952 on Delaware Ave. in Buffalo, N.Y. It was at the pumps in a Texaco gas station. I approached the owner of the station to obtain the name and address of the vehicle owner. All I could learn from him was that the car was from Clarence, N.Y. I had my father take me to Clarence to a Texaco station on the main street so I

could inquire about the car. The station owner said he was not aware of such a vehicle. My conclusion was that the owner of the car only used the Texaco in Buffalo and must have a different garage in this area.

In 1954 I traveled to Clarence by school bus for a concert with the East Aurora School Orchestra. The concert was in the Clarence High School across the street from the Texaco station. Next to the garage sat the 1938 Lincoln Zephyr 4-door convertible with the

top down. It was obvious that it had not moved in several months.


I had a friend take me to Clarence to see the owner of the garage where the car sat. When asked about the car and our prior meeting he had said "oh, that 1938 Lincoln convertible? He apparently played dumb two years earlier because he wanted the car.



I left my name and number with him so he could call me if he ever wanted to sell the car. A call came from him (Jim) in 1955 about the car. He had lost the station and was living in Buffalo on Delaware Ave. with-in a block of where I first saw the car. Again the same friend gave me a ride into Buffalo to see the owner. He was in financial trouble and was willing to sell the car at a fraction of what he paid for it. Of course, he bought a running car and was now selling a car full of leaves with wet


seats, floor rugs, top and dashboard. His only request was that I restore the car and drive it. He wanted a call when it was done.

The car was stored for 20 years before I had time and resources to do the restoration. Every nut and bolt was removed to totally dismantle the vehicle. The frame with attached body was put on a rotisserie, and was stripped, primed, and



The only chassis changes were the installation of a Columbia 2 speed rear axle, hydraulic brakes, and a dual brake master cylinder.







Under the hood I installed modern coils, a modern oil filter, an increased capacity oil pump, and an alternator. All changes are reversible and only made to make the car usable and dependable for tours.

The interior is also very close to original. From the factory the rear seat didn't have the usual buttons in the cushion or back. The front had buttons in both. I installed the buttons in front and back as shown in the factory photos I have found. I also lined the interior of the top in the rear seat as it came from the factory this way. Some documentation showed an unlined rear seat top.





Because of my busy schedule the car has had little use - Less than 2000 miles in 35 years. The restoration took 10 years. The car has seen many weddings; I have driven in some of them and friends have borrowed it for others. It may travel to Saratoga

Springs this year for the Glidden Tour. (This piece was written before the Glidden was held. Bob Murray got this photo of Paul and Sharon Kron with their Model A Roadster they ended up taking to Saratoga Springs) I did call Jim when the car was first put on the road. He was very happy to get the info. Unfortunately he passed away without ever getting a ride.

Overall it is a very nice car to drive. Contrary to popular belief it starts instantly, hot or cold, uses no oil, and little gas. There are many rumors about these V-12's but I have had no trouble with this one or my 1941 coupe. I believe that less than 400 Lincoln Zephyr 4-door convertibles were built in 1937, 8, and 9. This would make the car very rare. The specs are: 267.3 cu. in. displacement, 110 hp. 3 speed transmission with synchro in high and second. A Columbia 2-speed rear end and the tires are 7:00X16.

This was an interesting time for Lincoln. The company was founded in 1917 by Henry Leland. It had a short run and due to financial trouble and bankruptcy. Henry Ford bought it in 1922. The car was solid car with a V8. Edsel Ford became President and with several improvements sales went very well.

In 1932, the KB Model was announced with a V12 engine upping the hp from 120 in the V8 to 150 with the V12. Around the same time the design studio, started by Edsel Ford, began designing the Zephyr. The Zephyr started production in 1937 and continued through '48 and the continental started in 1940 and ran until 1948. The Continental was built by cutting a section out of the Zephyr body to make the car lower and look longer.

There was also a spare tire on the rear which became a symbol of the car – a generic term continental for a spare tire mounted on the rear of any car. Only two door bodies were made and

you could only have a convertible or a coupe only. Both Zephyr and Continental had the V 12. The names Zephyr and Continental disappeared after 48. For the 1949 model year the Lincoln became quite curvaceous

with a design quite different than the Zephyr or Continental and evolved into a large-long looking car with straighter lines. There were

quite a few twists and turns in the years to follow. A sort of exception occurred in the

mid-fifties when the Continental Mark II, like Sonny Weaver's (left), had a short run that kind of reflected the



earlier design with a "continental spare tire" fused into the trunk. The rest of the Lincoln and Continental history

will have to wait till another day.
