



HOW WOMEN FOUND A PLACE AT FORD MOTOR CO.



Following the accepted practice at the time in the earliest years of the automobile industry women found no place in that budding industry. As the industry matured Henry Ford began to hire windows of some his employees so that they might continue to support their families. Once women employees were introduced in this manner Ford instituted some regular female hires.

A lady named Georgia Boyer was the first woman hired onto the Ford Service Department. In 1922 she accompanied two other female employees on Henry Ford's Goodwill Delegation which traveled to Europe to observe the devastation of the First World War.

After Ford Motor Company's relocation to the Highland Park Plant in 1910 Blanche Furlong was employed. By 1915 there were several hun- Marsac became the first draftswoman hired. dred women working at the plant. Ms Furlong moved up to the position of Ford Division General Sales Office Supervisor by 1953 and was by then the longest serving female employee.

Many would be surprised to know that Clara Ford, wife of Henry was an early advocate for women's rights. Mrs. Ford was an active participant in the women's suffrage movement. She served as the Vice Chair of the Equal Suffrage League of Wayne County, Michigan. After the vote was secured with the passage of the 19th Amendment in 1920 she became involved in the Michigan League of Women voters. Mrs. Ford showed her support with a donation of \$3,000 to the League during the great depression.

Employed to work at the Ford's Willow Run Plant assembling B-24 "Liberator" aircraft Rose Monroe gained fame as the celebrated "Rosie the Riveter". At that time. A large percentage of single and married women joined the workforce. They worked in the war industry or replaced the men who were away for military service. Rose was one of 12,000 women hired by Ford to work in the wartime aircraft plant. She and her female co-workers were paid 85 cents and hour, the same rate paid to male employees. 8,685 B-24 bombers were produced at Willow Run having an impact on the outcome of the Second World War.

Besides working on the assembly line women began to enter other facets of the Ford Motor Company during the wartime years. Dolores Ford's metallurgical department added Ms. Jean Stommel, the first woman to join that department. She worked at the Highland Park Plant analyzing steel components for tanks and antiaircraft directors. Leota Carroll had the distinction of being the first woman hired as a designer at Ford.

When the war ended Ford, as other companies had done, laid off thousands of women employees replacing them with inexperienced men. A union protest arose and 150 women picketed the Highland Park Plant. Several hundred of the women were recalled for work as a result. The ensuing years saw increased opportunities for women as the company eventually moved to it's present status as an equal opportunity employer.

- Seasonal treats, photo ops, and plenty of classic car admiration



A 1945 Series 59C ½ Ton Pickup becomes the 31 Millionth Ford By John Emmering

As the German war machine was in the process of capitulation in Europe, Ford Motor Company briefly turned its attention to the production of the company's 31 Millionth vehicle on Thursday May 3, 1945. This time the vehicle was not a stylish sedan, since passenger car production had not yet resumed. The 31 Millionth Ford was a Spartan-appearing 1945 series 59C ½ ton pickup truck. Lacking the fanfare of earlier production milestones this event did not garner national press coverage or lavish ceremonies. As the pickup rolled off the Rouge assembly line however, worker's spirits were lifted as the prospect of a return to full peacetime production increased.





The U.S. War Production Board authorized a resumption of civilian pickup truck production in February of 1945 when it perceived a need for trucks for business and agricultural use. Initially a clone of the 1942 Model 29C pick up was produced. By May the trucks had been designated as Series 59C incorporating the modifications prepared for the 1946 models. These early pickups were designated 1945 models and the 59C series was continued throughout 1946. The pickups were the only civilian trucks built by Ford in 1945 and came only in "Village Green" with cream colored grills. Just 564 of these trucks were built in 1945 and they were not equipped with a spare tire due to war time shortages. These early post war trucks were eagerly purchased by businessmen and farmers weary of repairing and maintaining their tired older model pickups.


