

The NORG officers, members of the board of directors, and members of the 40th Anniversary Committee met at the Garland residence on April 2nd to discuss matters related to the 40th Anniversary Celebration. The meeting was very productive (believe it or not!) and a number of decisions were reached.

More specifically:

The date for the Celebration will be Sunday, September 13, 2009. The date on our charter is September 12, 1969, so this will be as close as possible to being exactly 40 years after our beginning.

The location will be the Raintree Country Club in Uniontown, Ohio. Other locations that were considered were Silver Lake Country Club in Silver Lake and Fairlawn Country Club in Fairlawn. Raintree was selected because it is an easily accessible location, the menu is reasonably priced and attractive, and the setting is attractive--and it has good parking facilities so we can drive our old cars if the weather cooperates.

The Celebration will take place in early afternoon (exact time to be decided). The brunch will include three entrées (beef, fish, and chicken) plus a selection of side dishes. No one should go away hungry!

We will try to make arrangements with the Raintree management to allow us to bring out own special 40th Anniversary cake.

This will be a one-day celebration with no additional side trips or other activities. We will just eat, remember, and enjoy 40 years worth of memories. We will have a digitalized master logo made so the 40th Anniversary logo (designed by our master designer Don Clink) can be put on caps, jackets, and shirts. We also are checking into having license plate medallions made with the 40th Anniversary logo on them. A couple of different options for these medallions are being explored. We also are checking into having windshield decals made up. Plans are under way for an electronic scrapbook of the club's activities over the years. This will be put on DVDs that will be provided for NORG members. If you have photos of club activities from years past, please contact Don Clink or Regis Schilling and let them know what you have.

Having a band or a vocal group provide entertainment was discussed. Possibilities are being explored. No decision has been reached on this matter.

The cutoff date for registering for the celebration will be August 15, 2009. The exact procedure for registering has yet to be worked out. In other words, your officers and the members of the board and the 40th Anniversary Committee have been hard at work and things are shaping up nicely. However, there are many, many things to do yet to make this celebration all that we want it to be. Don't hesitate to offer your ideas and your services to make this an event to remember. To emphasize this point, the following story seems appropriate:

I haven't actually tried this, but I saw it in a magazine and it sounded reasonable. The first time you tighten the lug nuts down on a freshly painted wheel is always a bit discouraging as you watch your nice new paint chip off around the lug nut. A suggestion for preventing this is to take a spare lug nut and fasten it to a bolt or a metal rod of the right diameter and chuck it in your variable speed electric drill. Put some valve grinding compound on the beveled area of the holes in the wheel where the lugs come through the wheel. Use your drill and the spare lug nut to carefully polish the paint off the beveled surfaces. Then when you install the wheel on the car and tighten the lug nuts they will rub against bare metal instead of against your new paint. It sounds worth a try.

Spring celebrations may leave you with an abundance of festively colored hard-boiled eggs and not enough ways to make use of them. Start off with tips for getting the perfect hard-boiled eggs, and then transform them in devilishly good ways. You'll never have trouble making or using hard-boiled eggs again!

The Perfect Hard-Boiled Eggs

Learn the art of cooking eggs to perfection without that gray-green tinge in the center.

Step 1: Place eggs in a saucepan in an even layer and cover in cold water, enough to reach the top of the shells.

Step 2: Cover with a lid and bring to a boil. Remove from heat immediately and let stand for about 10-15 minutes.

Step 3: Drain off the hot water and cover in cold water along with a few ice cubes. Let stand until completely cooled.

Keep these helpful hints in mind when making your hard-boiled eggs:

- Tip: Farm fresh eggs are much harder to peel, so opt for older eggs if you plan to hard boil.
- Tip: Add a small amount of baking soda to the boiling water to help make peeling easier.
- Tip: Try rolling hard-boiled eggs lightly against a counter for easier cracking and peeling.

The Best Deviled Eggs

INGREDIENTS

1 dozen hard-boiled eggs, peeled

- 3 heaping tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons fresh chives, finely chopped (plus more for garnish)
- 4 slices of cooked bacon, finely chopped (or bacon bits)
- 2 teaspoons dried tarragon 1/2 teaspoon dried mustard

1/2 teaspoon salt

Freshly ground pepper, to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

- Take each of your peeled hard-boiled eggs and slice off the bottom (wide) end to expose the yolk. Cut a small sliver off of the top (pointed) end to help it sit up straight.
- Scoop out the yolks into a medium-sized bowl and place the whites carefully onto a clean deviled egg tray or inside individual egg cups with the hole-end up for filling purposes.
- 3. In your bowl, mash the yolks with a fork and add mayonnaise, lemon juice, chives, bacon, tarragon and mustard, then stir well. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- 4. Use a pastry bag with a piping tip or a zip top plastic bag with a corner snipped at an angle to fill your egg whites with the yolk mixture. Add more mayo if the mixture is too thick to pass through. Garnish with chopped fresh chives

Important Information on Carburetor Rebuilding Kits for the 1940 - 1953 Holley Carburetors

Written by an employee of Dayton Parts Company (Supplier of the Kits)

Because of continuing customer problems and questions concerning the Chandler-Grove, Holley, Ford, Flathead V8 carburetors, I thought it was time to make a statement about the current problems many of you may have faced with your rebuilt carburetors and aftermarket carburetor kits over the last few years.

There are NO original factory Holley carburetor kits being made, including those with the HOLLEY trade name. Since there are only 4 remaining actual manufacturers of carburetor parts and kits for Domestic American made carburetors, most of the common parts are coming from one source. Up until 5 years ago, Dana Corp. Pacer Division, made ALL of the common "square box" carburetor kits. These were packaged using over 70 different company trade names; however all were in the usual shrink wrapped inner tray, containing the same parts in all kits, regardless of the name on the outside. These kits were of reasonable quality, and most had no problems with the parts contents. Standard Motor Products also made their own line of "Hygrade" carburetor kits, using mostly their own parts, manufactured in their plant in Puerto Rico, which has since shut down. Tomco Fuel Systems also made their own kits in St. Louis, Mo, using many of the Pacer parts. Walker Products in California also made a lower quality line of carburetor kits. The last, and smallest company was Daytona Parts Company, in Florida.

In 2001 Dana Corp, sold their Pacer Division to Standard Motor Products, who then made a deal with Walker Products, to continue making the "square box" kit line for outside distribution. The only problem, was Standard and Walker both chose to trash the original Pacer Quality tooling, and go with Walker parts, most of which are made in Mexico!

Now we come to the present, and the reason for this information. The current contents in ANY "square box" kit, with any name on it; **DOES NOT CONTAIN a Power valve assembly that will work in any of the FORD/HOLLEY, model 94, etc, 3 bolt base carburetors!** The design change to the power valves was made by Walker, which chose to modify their old style with a "step" cast on the flange of the valve, to allow the use of a large ID seal gasket. Because of this "step" when you try to use the power valve in the Ford carburetor, it will not seal up against the bottom of the bowl, and then leaks fuel into the vacuum chamber, below the valve, causing a constant "rich" running condition!!

Also, the thread length on the valve is critical, as another style power valve has extra long threads for use in a modern Holley 4bbl carburetor, with stripped metering blocks. The long thread style will also **NOT work**, as the thread length interferes with the bowl casting, and will not seal. The genuine Holley power valve will also not work, as it also has the "step", and the brass head is to large in diameter, and when installing, the head catches on the bowl casting, and opens the valve wide open!!

Another problem with the "square box" kits is the inclusion of a "black" rubber pump cup. This is BUNA rubber, and will NOT last for any time at all with the alcohol laced gasoline. Do not use the black cups, but only a "blue" fluorocarbon cup, which is an alcohol resistant high quality rubber compound. Current kits containing a "leather" accelerator pump assembly with a "blue" cardboard protective cover, is Not a correct accelerator pump. The stem length is to short, and will cause a "stumble" or hesitation on acceleration. To much fuel, to quick, and to much duration of squirt. This short pump is actually only original on the Holley model 885F 2bbl, (49-51 mercury-lincoln carburetor) and the model 1901F 2bbl, on 52-53 Mercury and 1952 Lincoln.

The only kits I am aware of that are correct, is the kit made in the USA, by Daytona Parts Company, and distributed by several of the Ford parts vendors. These contain a correct power valve (OEM style), and a correct length Leather accelerator pump, along with a special alcohol resistant needle & seat assembly.

I hope this information helps a few of you to prevent undue trouble-shooting problems with your "rich" running problem carburetors. Ron Daytona Parts Company

TOOLS EXPLAINED:

WIRE WHEEL: Cleans paint off bolts and then throws them somewhere under the workbench at the speed of light. Also removes fingerprints and hard-earned calluses from fingers in about the time it takes you to say, 'Oh Crap!!!!'

ELECTRIC HAND DRILL: Normally used for spinning pop rivets in their holes until you die of old age.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads. Sometimes used in the creation of blood-blisters.

VISE-GRIPS: Generally used after pliers to completely round off bolt heads. If nothing else is available, they can also be used to transfer intense welding heat to the palm of your hand.

OXYACETYLENE TORCH: Used almost entirely for lighting various flammable objects in your shop on fire. Also handy for igniting the grease inside the wheel hub out of which you want to remove a bearing race.


HYDRAULIC FLOOR JACK: Used for lowering an automobile to the ground after you have installed your new brake shoes, trapping the jack handle firmly under the bumper.

DAMMIT TOOL: Any handy tool that you grab and throw across the garage while yelling 'DAMMIT' at the top of your lungs. It is also, most often, the next tool that you will need.

It's still as good a car as it was the day the new Model A Ford was announced and there's no need to sacrifice it.

The Model T Ford is still used by more people than any other automobile. Eight million are in active service right now and many of them can be driven one, two, three and five years and even longer.

Bring your car to us and let us look it over. You'll be surprised to see how little it costs to put it in tip-top shape.

New fenders, for instance, cost from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each, with a labor charge of \$1.00 to \$2.50. Tuning up the motor and replacing commutator case, brush and vibrator points costs only \$1.00, with a small charge for material. Brake shoes can be installed and emergency brakes equalized for a labor charge of only \$1.25. A labor charge of \$4.00 to \$5.00 will cover the overhauling of the front axle, rebushing springs and spring perches, and straightening, aligning and adjusting wheels.

The labor charge for overhauling the average rear axle runs from \$5.75 to \$7.00. Grinding valves and cleaning carbon can be done for \$3.00 to \$4.00.

A set of four new pistons and rings cost only \$7.00. For a labor charge of \$20 to \$25.00 you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts are extra.
