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One of my students brought to my attention a story she found on the internet and I found it worth passing along. Of course, if it appeared on the internet you know it MUST be true!

According to this story, a lawyer in Charlotte, North Carolina, bought a box of very expensive cigars and insured them against,

among other things, fire. Within a month he had smoked the entire box of cigars. He then filed a claim against his insurance company, stating that the cigars had been "lost in a series of small fires."

The insurance company refused to pay, citing the obvious reason--that the man had consumed the cigars in the normal fashion for which they were intended.

The lawyer sued the insurance company--and WON!

The judge in the case agreed with the insurance company that the lawyer's claim was frivolous, but stated that nevertheless the lawyer held a policy from the insurance company in which the insurance company had agreed to insure the cigars against, among other things, fire. Since the insurance company had failed to specify what it considered to be an unacceptable fire, the company was obligated to pay the claim. Rather than endure a lengthy and costly appeal process, the insurance company accepted the ruling and paid the lawyer \$15,000 for the "loss" of his cigars that had "perished" in the "series of small fires."

(Here's where the story makes you chuckle!) After the lawyer cashed his \$15.000 check, the insurance company had him arrested on 24 counts of ARSON--one count for each cigar. Based on the testimony he had given in his case against the insurance company, the lawyer was convicted of intentionally burning his insured property and was sentenced to 24 months in jail and a \$24,000 fine.

Moral to the story: Sometimes there IS justice in this world and things do turn out as they should




the presentation will take place prior to the General Meeting. .

Meat-and-Potatoes Meal in Minutes

Do images of a hearty meat-and-potatoes meal look more overwhelming than appetizing? Not with these smart tips! First, choose several



cuts of meat that cook quickly, and keep three or four packages stocked in your freezer (pork chops or boneless/skinless chicken breasts are ideal). Put the meat in your refrigerator the night before, and it should thaw by the following afternoon. Coat the meat in a mixture of olive

oil, lemon juice, and fresh herbs, and cook in a small amount of oil in a nonstick pan. In minutes, these delicious cuts of meat are completely cooked and infused with the flavor of fresh herbs.

For a quick side dish, boiled red potatoes can be done in 10 minutes. When they're soft enough to slip off of a knife, drain and coat with margarine, fresh dill, and salt and pepper to taste.





Technical Tips

Borrowed from the July 2009 Crater Lake RG 142 Newsletter ("Crater Views"):

When you remove your oil filter to change oil, don't just throw it in the recycling bin! First, let it drain on your leaf springs. Point your car or truck uphill and just place the old oil filter on the top of the spring right behind the spring shackle-mounting bold. The old, used oil will transfer/drain from the canister to give your leaf springs the rust-preventative cushion they need to sustain the wear and tear they get from our roads. (Attributed to James E. 


